r Ian Porter The Remarkable Mr Selfridge

Gordon Selfridge had a rich and varied public and private life. He was an innovator in the retail trade, a tireless worker during the Great War, and a staunch supporter of the Royal family. Ian is a novelist and historian.

22 October

er Russell Bowes The Inexhaustible Mr Paxton

A classic tale of rags to riches of a hugely talented Victorian. Paxton was an inventor, the designer of Crystal Palace, an architect, the head gardener to the Duke of Devonshire, MP, the owner of Punch, and a railway magnate. To cap it all, he was the first man in Europe to produce a flower from the Giant Amazonian water lily. Russell is a freelance garden historian.

5 November

Anthony Poulton-Smith What's in a Name?

Anthony delights in words and the development of language. In this talk, he will explain the origins of some UK place names. A prolific writer, he has also created numerous quizzes, crosswords and works as an editor and proof reader. Among many other activities he chairs the Tamworth Literary Festival.

Lindsay is the Museum of Croydon archivist. She will take us through the records of Croydon from its earliest days to the present. She will then focus on the history of Purley and its development from a small village to the present town.

A well known landmark on the eastern side of Croydon, Shirley windmill was built in 1854. It was opened to the public over 20 years ago. Frank, a long standing member of the Friends of Shirley Windmill, considers the history, operation and special features of the windmill.

Gillian will concentrate on, and celebrate, some of the brilliant and often eccentric characters who found themselves serving at Bletchley.

Delia will take us on a trip down memory lane! When World War II was declared, the government was keen to keep morale as high as possible. The Entertainments National Service Association was set up and entertainers encouraged to join. Over 50,000 did so, many of whom became household names loved by troops around the world.
